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Introduction

What is Confirmation?

Confirmation is a Sacrament where one receives the Holy Spirit who strengthens the individual in their Christian mission (which is to be disciples of Christ and spread His Word throughout the world). This does not mean that one does not receive the Holy Spirit at Baptism, rather, Confirmation completes the graces received at Baptism in order to take on a more active role in the Body of Christ (the Church). The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that, "by the sacrament of Confirmation, [the baptized] are more perfectly bound to the Church and are enriched with a special strength of the Holy Spirit. Hence they are, as true witnesses of Christ, more strictly obliged to spread and defend the faith by word and deed." Those who receive Confirmation are choosing to take on a greater role in the Church as soldiers who defend and spread the truth's of the Catholic faith. In doing so, the Holy Spirit is bestowed upon the

individual in order to provide the strength needed to fulfill this task.

What the Saints Have to Say About Confirmation

"Remember, then, that you received a spiritual seal, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of knowledge and reverence, the spirit of holy fear. Keep safe what you received. God the Father sealed you, Christ the Lord strengthened you and sent the Spirit into your hearts as the pledge of what is to come."-St. Ambrose


"O Holy Spirit, descend plentifully into my heart. Enlighten the dark corners of this neglected dwelling and scatter there Thy cheerful beams."- St. Augustine

"It is necessary for him that has been baptized also to be anointed, so that by his having received chrism, that is, the anointing, he can be the anointed of God and have in him the grace of Christ"- Cyprian of Carthage

7 Gifts of the Holy Spirit

In receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation, one opens themselves up to the gifts of the Holy Spirit. These gifts enable one to be strengthened in order to become soldiers of the Catholic faith and defend the truths of the Church. Likewise, the gifts of the Holy Spirit sustain us throughout our lives. There are seven gifts of the Holy Spirit. These gifts are identified in Isaiah 11:1-3, and they are as follows: wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of God.



Aquinas' (Summarized) Explanation of the 7 Gifts

- 1) Wisdom Knowledge and judgement of Divine tings.
- 2) Understanding insight into the very heart of things, especially those higher truths that are necessary for our eternal salvation
- 3) Counsel allows God to direct our life especially in manners of salvation.
- 4) Fortitude Choosing good over evil especially in difficult situations.
- 5) Knowledge is the ability to judge correctly about matters of faith and right action
- 6) Piety worshiping God in a way that is owed to Him.
- 7) Fear of the Lord "filial" or chaste fear whereby we revere God and avoid separating ourselves from him—as opposed to "servile" fear, whereby we fear punishment.

Confirmation in Scripture

Scripture contains several passages about Confirmation. Below we will address three passages and provide a brief explanation for each.

Acts 8:14-17

"Now when the apostles at Jerusalem heard that Samar'ia had received the word of God, they sent to them Peter and John, who came down and prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Spirit; for it had not yet fallen on any of them, but they had only been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. Then they laid their hands on them and they received the Holy Spirit."

Explanation:

In the passage above we see how Baptism and Confirmation are connected to each other. Peter and John were sent to lay their hands on those who were Baptized but had not yet received the Holy Spirit. It is here that we see that Baptism is completed by Confirmation which opens one up to fully accept the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Acts 19:1-6

While Apollos was at Corinth, Paul passed through the upper country and came to Ephesus. There he found some disciples. And he said to them, "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you believed?" And they said, "No, we have never even heard

that there is a Holy Spirit." And he said, "Into what then were you baptized?" They said, "Into John's baptism." And Paul said, "John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, Jesus." On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. And when Paul had laid his hands upon them, the Holy Spirit came on them; and they spoke with tongues and prophesied.

Explanation:

Similar to the previous passage, we see that Paul is offering to bestow the gift of the Holy Spirit on those who have already been Baptized. Thus, Confirmation is a separate Sacrament than Baptism, but is united to Baptism in that it completes it.

Hebrews 6:1-2

Therefore let us leave the elementary doctrines of Christ and go on to maturity, not laying again a foundation of repentance from dead works and of faith toward God, with instruction about ablutions, the laying on of hands, the resurrection of the dead, and eternal judgment.

Explanation

In the Passage to the Hebrews we see that Confirmation (laying on of hands) is a gift that brings maturity in the faith. This does not mean a physical maturity, but a sacramental maturity. It strengthens and elevates ones faith when accepted with a heart open to the grace of God.

Signs and Symbols in Confirmation

Like in every Sacrament, signs symbols are important. Signs and symbols reveal to us the spiritual realities of what is occurring in the Sacrament. That is, symbols allow us as humans to understand what is happening spiritually during the Sacrament. There are three main signs and symbols occurring during the Sacrament of Confirmation.

1) **Chrism Oil -** As mentioned in the previous issue of *Heart and* Soul, Chrism oil is a sign of anointing (as well as strength and healing). During Confirmation, one is being anointed as a defender of the faith. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that, "By Confirmation, Christians, that is, those who are anointed, share more completely in the mission of Jesus Christ and the fullness of the Holy Spirit with which he is filled, so that their lives may give off 'the aroma of Christ" (1294). The Bishop, who is the administrator of the Confirmation (unless a priest is given permission to do so), anoints the one being confirmed by making the sign of the cross on the forehead of the individual while saying, "Be sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit." In doing so, one is now called to called to preach Christ crucified to the world.

- 2) Laying on of Hands—As we saw in the Scripture passages on page 6, the laying on of hands is necessary for the Sacrament of Confirmation to occur. The laying on of hands is when the Bishop invokes the Holy Spirit upon the individual by placing his hands over their head. In doing so, the Holy Spirit enters the individual in a complete way and fills the individual with grace which strengthens them to defend and teach the faith with their words and actions.
- 3) **Sign of Peace** The service of Confirmation ends with the sign of peace. The Bishop at the end of the service will say on behalf of the community, "Peace be with you," which is a welcoming of the one being confirmed into the Church as a full practicing member. The confirmed individual, at this point, is now fully part of the Mystical Body of Christ (The Church).

Confirmation Sponsors

In the Roman Catholic Church, those who are receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation are to select a sponsor to help guide them in their faith journey. Canon Law states that, "the sponsor is to take care that the confirmed person behaves as a true witness of Christ and faithfully fulfills the obligations inherent in this sacrament" (Cann. 892). As such, the sponsor must be willing to commit to accepting the following responsibilities:

- Be a practicing Catholic in good standing with the Church
- Pray with and for the one being confirmed. Likewise, help them grow and nurture their prayer life after Confirmation
- Become aware of the faith life of the one being confirmed in order to help them grow deeper in the faith
- Continue teaching the one confirmed about the faith even after they have been confirmed
- Encourage the one confirmed to continue to receive the Sacraments after they have been confirmed



Confirmation Saint

One of the traditions that comes with being confirmed is the choosing of a patron saint. In choosing a saint, one is desiring to mimic that saint and ask for their intercession so that they may grow in holiness.

However, in choosing a saint at Confirmation, one is also choosing to accept their name. That is, the saints name becomes their new name. In the Christian tradition, when one has a deep experience of God or is taking on a great role in the Church, they take on a new name. For instance, Simon takes on the name Peter when Christ makes him the "Rock of the Church" (Matt. 16:18). In receiving Confirmation, one is

experiencing God in deep way by receiving the third Person of the Trinity, the Holy Spirit. Likewise, one is taking on a greater role in the Church when confirmed because they now become defenders and teachers of the faith. For these reason, one takes on a new name to indicate their spiritual growth and new role in the Church. By choosing a saint name, the saint can then be a special intercessor for the one being confirmed. The saint, by their life, can also motivate the one being confirmed to persevere and strive for holiness.
